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George Wilson McConkie IV passed away on April 17, 2021 after a courageous battle with Parkinson's Disease and cancer. He passed peacefully in his home at the age of 83 with his wife and children by his side. George was born in Holden, Millard County, Utah, on July 15, 1937 to George Wilson McConkie III and Mabel Stephenson McConkie. George served a mission for the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints in the Eastern States Mission, USA from 1957-1959. He married Orlene Carol Johnson September 6, 1962 in the Logan, Utah Temple of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. George earned his Master of Science degree from Brigham Young University and his PhD from Stanford University. He and his young family then moved to Ithaca, New York where George taught at Cornell University for 14 years. In 1978 he accepted a teaching position at the University of Illinois in Champaign-Urbana.

George excelled in his field of Educational Psychology and provided pioneering research on eye movement, cognition and reading. He became world renowned for his groundbreaking research. This grew into a position at the Beckman Institute for Advanced Science and Technology at the University of Illinois. Among the honors George received were his induction into the Reading Hall of Fame, appointment as Senior Scholar in the College of Education at the University of Illinois, the Outstanding Scientific Contribution to the Study of Reading Award, and a Fellowship from the Fulbright Scholar Program of Taiwan.

In addition to George's tremendous professional career he was also an active member in his church where he served as a Seminary Teacher, Bishop, Counselor in the Stake Presidency, Choir Director, Sunday School Teacher and more. George loved spending time with family, learning, music, fishing and poetry.

In addition to his loving wife, Orlene Johnson McConkie, he is survived by his fourteen children: Lynnette (David) Mooth, Heather (Bryan) Usevitch, April (John) Rhiner, Faline (Robert) Coffelt,

George will be remembered for a long time for his contributions to the study of reading, visual cognition, and the critical role played by eye movements in both. His career spanned roughly 30 years. In the mid 1970s, George and his graduate student Keith Rayner developed the gaze-contingent methodology and measures of the perceptual span in reading, and their results revolutionized our understanding of the process of reading. They showed that readers of English extract information asymmetrically around the point of fixation, from 8-12 letters to the right of fixation, and 4-6 to the left, or, more generally, from the upcoming word to the right. Further work by George, Keith, and their colleagues and students, used this methodology to further delineate precisely what sorts of information the reader is able to pick up from the to-be-fixated word. In the 1980s, together with his graduate students David Zola and Gary Wolverton, George showed that the theory of the visual integrative buffer could not explain perceptual continuity across fixations. George showed that by having people read text written in alternating upper and lower case letters, and gaze-contingently changing the case of every letter, each time readers made a saccade. This complete change of all perceptual information in the text across fixations did not cause the predicted catastrophic disruption of reading. Readers didn't notice the perceptual changes across fixations at all, suggesting that rather than letter shapes being carried across saccades, it was identity information. In the 1990s, George then decided to test the same idea with scenes, by changing pairs of photographs that differed in key details (e.g., in a photo of two men, swapping their heads). He made those changes during viewers' saccades, and asked them to press a button if they noticed any changes. To everyone's surprise, many people completely missed the changes for long periods of time. When George's graduate student John Grimes presented their results at a Cognitive Science conference in Vancouver, a low-tech demonstration during the talk caused a great stir among the audience. From that work, the phenomenon later to be named "Change Blindness" was born. George and graduate student Chris Curry followed that up by making important contributions to our understanding of perceptual stability across saccades by showing that one could move an entire scene image, or the entire scene background, during a viewer's saccade, without the movement being detected, so long as the target of the saccade was not moved. This suggested that the saccade target has a special status in maintaining visual stability across saccades. Towards the end of his career, George and graduate student Shunnan Yang also caused a stir in the community by showing that for a moderate population of relatively short duration fixations, the recognizability of a fixated word seemed to play no role in determining readers' fixation durations. They showed that by having people read pages of text, and occasionally, for a single eye fixation, changing all of the letters on the page to random letters (among other various manipulations). They found that for fixations George also influenced a much larger group of graduate students, post-docs, and colleagues, around the world, from the US, to Europe, and China. He played a key role in generating greater interest in using eye movements to study perceptual and cognitive processes. George was always a soft spoken, kind, and patient mentor, colleague, and friend. He was also an important and caring member of his religious community, which was always very important to him. And most importantly to him, he was a devoted father, grandfather, and great grandfather to a large and loving family. George will be sadly missed by all who knew him. -Les
