Bill was a patient and dedicated educator, a devoted father, and a loving husband. He enjoyed camping, fishing, playing the guitar, photography and volunteering. When out for hikes, he always had a camera handy. He was an accomplished photographer.

He was especially influenced by his mother who taught him to live life with optimism, kindness, and honesty. He had a quirky sense of humor and a sunny disposition that endured even in his final days.

He is survived by his wife, Susan, his lovely daughter, Anna Jarvis, and his oldest brother, Jim (Cathy) Jarvis, as well as stepsons, Christopher (Nora) St. John, Jonathan (Erin) St. John, and Daniel St. John, and grandchildren, Lucas and Audrey (Jonathan & Erin). He was predeceased by his older siblings, Patrick Jarvis and Janet Young. He had many friends and loving relatives left behind in Upstate NY. Progressing dementia prevented him from visiting in recent times.
